


Figure 1. Reports to the Conservation Officer Service (COS) and WildSafeBC's Wildlife Alert Reporting Program (WARP) by species from Jan 1, 2017– Nov 3, 2022.





Figure 2. Black bear reports to the Conservation Officer Service (COS) and WildSafeBC's Wildlife Alert Reporting Program (WARP) by month from Jan 1, 2017– Nov 3, 2022.

Garbage Tagging & Door-to-Door

Garbage Tagging:

- 12 routes
- 653 garbage carts tagged
 - Including 170 carts in West Kelowna

Door to door:

- 6 routes
- 253 homes
 - Including 214 homes in West Kelowna





School Presentations

- 10 schools/organizations
- 25 presentations
- 700 students
 - Including 10 students
 from We Think Outside Homeschooling and 51 students from Shannon Lake Elementary







Display Booth

- 13 community events
- 1350+ people
 - Including 207 people at the Westside Daze Event
 - 60 at the Westbank Farmers Market
 - 56 at the Grizzli Winery Thanksgiving Market

- 4 media releases throughout the season






Business Pledge & Bare Campsite Program

Challenges

- Bear attractants unmanaged
 - Garbage
 - Fruit trees
- Deer attractants unmanaged
 - Strata issues
 - Feeding deer
 - Unsuitable deer-fencing
- Domestic pets
 - Coyotes/Cougars





Opportunities for 2023

- Continue to educate residents on
 - attractant management
 - conflict reduction practices
- Continued promotion of Bare Campsite and Business Pledge Program
- Bear Smart initiative work
 - Bear Hazard Assessment
 - Identify and map high risk areas, attractants, wildlife corridors
 - Wildlife Attractant Management Bylaws
 - Municipality driven
