During the July 7th meeting of neighbourhood association, chaired by CAO Paul Gipps, it was requested the city's website include a link to NA websites and contacts.

A link would make it much easier for residents to contact their local NA. Currently the only methods for residents to learn about their NAs is through word of mouth, social media or publications of upcoming events/meetings.

In conversation with city staff on April 26th at the open-house held at the West Kelowna Yacht Club, it was indicated the city would not entertain the creation of a link to NA websites on the City of West Kelowna website. The reason given was the "fluid" nature of NAs, with NA Executives changing etc, it would be too difficult to maintain.










Controlled crosswalks on Shannon Lake Road at Shannon Way, Shannon Woods Drive and Regional Park




Residents' Comments:

- This is VERY MUCH needed. A lot of our teenagers need to be crossing these roads to catch city busses to school and younger children getting on school busses as well.
- I've seen far too many close calls when someone is stopped for a pedestrian and a vehicle passes on outside and almost takes out pedestrians
- Drivers do not stop for pedestrians trying to cross at Shannon Woods Drive. I have experienced this numerous times. Also, difficult to see people waiting to cross.

Roundabout

Residents' Comments


- A dangerous intersection with drivers jumping the stop sign
- Drivers are going up Tallus ridge from Shannon Lake at high speeds. A roundabout would provide more safety for the neighbourhood
- I don't know if the round about is the answer.... But something needs to be done to make this safer.
- I live in Tallus and have seen many close calls, especially turning left into Tallus off Shannon Lake Road. Also getting out of Tallus going North on Shannon Lake Rd. can be very difficult!
- Tallus Ridge Drive also needs a sidewalk and cross walk, you risk your life crossing. And cars zoom up Tallus Ridge Drive at 90+Km/h, someone is going to get killed one day if this isn't addressed.

"The Tallus roundabout is not currently in the ten-year plan however the priorities are currently being reviewed through the Transportation Master Plan(TMP) process. A Development Cost Charge (DCC) Road priority session will be held with **Council later this spring/summer**. This is the opportunity to revisit the ten-year plan specific to arterial roads and reprioritize accordingly. <u>The Tallus Drive</u> roundabout has already been designed."




Question to City of Kelowna Council and Staff

The need for a roundabout was identified in the 2014 TMP. With this intersection being identified as a major concern by residents and a community policing study, will council make this a priority and commit to a construction start-up date?

Improved Traffic Enforcement

"62% of residents agree or strongly agree greater traffic enforcement is needed."



They should be in place before summer it is hoped."






A report prepared by Tetra Tech Canada shows the city's road network has deteriorated since 2015.

"According to the report road conditions are deteriorating across the network but quicker along the arterial network."


"Shannon Lake Road, which had a rating of 70 or satisfactory in 2015 has fallen to 22 or very poor during the last update in 2022."


"Only 10 per cent of the arterial network is rated as good with 49 per cent in poor or very poor condition."






At Asquith Road – improvised walkway





At Golf Course Estates – Superior right-of-way












Dr Beck, author of an Accident Analysis and Prevention study, found:

"The results our study demonstrate that a single stripe of white paint does not provide a safe space for cyclists. There is less of a conscious requirement for drivers to provide additional passing space with painted bike lanes than no bike lane at all. Greater investment is needed in providing physical barriers that separates cyclists from motor vehicles."




25 kg bike versus 1 Tonne Vehicle

Benefits of multi-use pathways

- Reduced speed A study commissioned by the City of Surrey found that the perceived reduction of road widths on some of the city's arterial roads resulted in 13 to 20 km/h reductions in speed.
- Physical barrier with less exposure for pedestrians.
- Cyclists of all ages are 8 times more likely to use.
- Addresses the future (E-bikes)
- Improved quality of life for people with limited access and limited abilities (not everyone has access to a vehicle)

Added benefits and considerations...

Decreasing the distance for pedestrians to cross also decreases the time that a pedestrian is in the street and vulnerable to being hit by a car. By having a shorter distance to cross, the pedestrian completes the cross more quickly. This also allows traffic to flow more fluidly.



Addressing Road Calming Reducing perceived lane width by moving curbs in would result in a decrease of up to 15km/h in vehicle speeds.



The perception of narrower streets help promote slower driving speeds which, in turn, reduce the severity of crashes. There is no actual change to road width thus insuring adequate access for emergency vehicles.



The city staff has expressed the challenge of tying new active transportation infrastructure in with existing infrastructure.

QUESTION:

To serve the community now and in the future, should we not bring roads up to current recommended design standards rather than simply add onto existing, outof-date designs?
