Thank you for awaiting the City's further reply.

Please note, our responses will also be provided to Council as part of the Annual Report review process.

Local government financial statements include an annual surplus that accounts for all revenues and expenses including grant funding for capital, Development Cost Charges and Gas Tax (Canada Community-Building Fund – Community Works Fund) allocations. These items are already committed to specific projects and reserves and must be removed from the surplus in order to calculate the operating surplus. These make up almost \$31.4 million of the annual surplus reducing the actual down to \$2.8 million. Operating surpluses and deficits can occur in any given year and the retention of surplus funds helps protect against unexpected future deficits. The Central Okanagan Regional Emergency Program and its local government partners have invested in a centralized Emergency Operations Centre in Kelowna to efficiently serve the needs of the whole region. It is an operation that is backed up with first-available staff from any of the region's local governments, who are able to step in to help quickly. An added Emergency Operations Centre in West Kelowna was investigated several years ago but was not deemed feasible at the time for several reasons including the lack of power redundancy. As our community continues to grow and a redundant power supply is secured, a backup Emergency Operations Centre somewhere on the Westside may be feasible. For now a backup Emergency Operations Centre is available at the Kelowna Airport, where there is a secondary power supply.

Please consider that the Annual Report is a snapshot of our initiatives and we prioritize the inclusion of the full Audited Financial Statements. If all City activities and achievements were present, the document would be more than 100 pages.

The City's relationship-building efforts with Westbank First Nation and the syilx Peoples are continual and we are partners in many local services with Westbank First Nation. The City also has agreements with Westbank First Nation to provide fire/rescue service and full access to parks, recreation programs and community and sports amenities and facilities. We respectfully acknowledge our presence on the traditional territory of the syilx/Okanagan Peoples and the importance of Truth and Reconciliation are reflected in Council's Strategic Priorities within the 2022 Annual Report. This is the first one I read in fairly good detail - and I appreciate the opportunity.

I think it is overall extremely well laid out - the financial section is pretty heavy, so if there is a way to give a snap shot in a visual way of what is coming in and going out, it would be good to see. For example, where does our money come from (taxes, government, etc) and where does it go (infrastructure, Shannon Lake stuff, etc.). As a citizen, I would like this to be extremely transparent, so I can better understand how much things are costing us.

Also, I would really like to better understand where the sidewalks are, and where they are going next (is there a map with the plans over next 5 years and last 5 years?). We did not seem to make many in the last year, and none that I have seen around Westbank Centre - except for a condo (I think they built it, so not the city). I live in West Bank centre (solar road) and I can barely walk anywhere on a side walk, plus I cannot even get out of our street without violating traffic laws (j-walking to get to a sidewalk). There are 8 houses on my street, most with kids, and this is a HUGE topic for us. Would be great to know what the solution is and when we can expect a side walk or even a crossing sign (so cars can let us pass). If needed, I am happy to buy one for our street so the kids can get to the side walk safely.

Not sure the budget, but would be great to have a 5 minute video created summarizing this report for our community, as well as comparing it to the last 5 years. The data is nice, but without historical context it really does not mean that much. Take RCMP calls - or sidewalks built - or whatever - they do not mean much without seeing last year.

Also, I do not see much mention of anything reconciliation focused with either WFN, the syilx nation, or Metis/other Indigenous peoples in the community. HAs there been any thinking on this, discussions, meetings or anything in this space?

I think this will help us understand the cost of things and where the energy is focuses, and to make sure the money is not all going to the new sub-division work and actually being spread around the community.

Looking forward to hearing back on a few of these points, and learning more!
